

KEYS TO EFFECTIVE FINAL EXAMS

PLAN EXAMS STRATEGICALLY

- Address all major topics, proportionally weighted to their significance in the course.
- Create questions that connect theoretical knowledge to practical applications.
- Plan exams with realistic time limits to ensure students finish comfortably.

CRAFT QUESTIONS THAT MATTER

- Write questions in straightforward terms, avoiding jargon or overly complex phrasing.
- Design questions that promote Higher-order thinking rather than simple recall.
- Avoid trick questions by focusing on assessing comprehension and application.
- Provide clear instructions by using structured formatting and explicitly outlining expectations.
- Design questions in varied formats to engage diverse thinking styles and promote comprehensive assessment.

SUPPORT STUDENTS FOR SUCCESS

- Offer review sessions to clarify complex topics and address student concerns and questions.
- Communicate details early by sharing exam dates, times, formats, and any rules or expectations well in advance.
- Provide accommodations to students' with disabilities by offering extended time, or assistive tools.
- Create a supportive environment by fostering a calm, focused space for exams, free from unnecessary distractions.

REFLECT POST-EXAM

- Review student results to identify strengths, weaknesses, and patterns across questions or topics.
- Assess which questions were clear, aligned with learning objectives, and appropriately challenging.
- Use input from colleagues and students to refine the exam process and content.
- Apply insights from the reflection to enhance future exams and teaching strategies.
- Confirm the exam accurately assessed the intended course objectives and adjust as needed for better alignment.
